We expect to live in PNG for about 3 years, except for Ben, who will return to the USA after high school graduation in June 2008, and Nate, who will stay in the USA to continue studies at Brown University. Please pray that the many logistical requirements are met and the right doors for effective ministry open for us.

The house we were renting has been sold, so we will be living in downtown Buena Vista February through May, 2007. Our new address is above.



Radios Proclaim the Gospel

Can you imagine life without radio, television, CD players, MP3 players, cell phones, etc.? We can, as many don't have access to electrical power or the means to buy these things. Even though the vast majority of Papua New Guineans live without electrical power (about 90%), and batteries are expensive for many people, radios are more common than you might think. This opens the door for another way to get the Word of God to people.

The Papua New Guinean government lists the literacy rate (in any language) in rural areas at 51.7%. Most cultures

within Papua New Guinea have strong oral traditions, but little or no written tradition. That makes radio ministry even more important. Radio reaches people where they are in their gardens, in market places, and in their homes. They can hear the Word of God, even if they can't read it.

Last year, Galcom International said they would give us 1,000 solar-powered, fix-tuned

FM radios if we would cover the shipping to PNG (about \$1 to \$2 per radio... we won't know the final figures until we get all the bills, including customs charges, as the radios are still in transit). We said YES, by faith, believing that God would lay it on the hearts of enough people to pay that bill. These

radios are tuned to the frequency of Wantok Radio Light, the Christian radio network that reaches much of Papua New Guinea, including an FM station in Kainantu.

We know that there are creative people out there to help us engage Christians to give into this work.

Prayer: WOW... we've been blessed to have a strong prayer team, but we know we can stretch further in this area. Col. 1:4,9-14

Re-Entry: Re-entry back into the American lifestyle after being gone for 4 1/2 years has been one of the hardest parts of our missionary experience so far. We need sensitive, caring people to help with our re-entry needs when we return again.
